Masterplan Summary Overview

The purpose of this Manukau Masterplan Summary document is to set out the long-term regeneration vision for Manukau city centre.

It captures the aspirations shared by partnering agencies including Eke Panuku, Auckland Council, Auckland Transport, mana whenua and the Otara-Papatoetoe and Manurewa local boards.

The document outlines the strategic development approach, the spatial outcomes sought for buildings, the public realm upgrade projects, and the staging of projects over time.

A Suite of Documents

The Masterplan builds on the plans for Manukau that were established in the 2017 Manukau Framework Plan and High Level Project Plans (HLPP). The Framework Plan outlines a shared vision and approach for Eke Panuku and its partners to regenerate the Transform Manukau area by 2040.

THE MASTERPLAN SUMMARY

Programme Background

Manukau is an Eke Panuku regeneration area with the aim of creating a thriving city centre, connected to healthy and sustainable neighbourhoods.

The Manukau area is home to a young, diverse and growing population, rich in Pacific and Māori culture with strong community networks. Manukau is located at the centre of the growing South Auckland region only eight kilometres from the Auckland International Airport and well linked to the Auckland City Centre by rail and bus. It has a civic and tertiary education, a retail focus and several Auckland-wide attractions.

Since 2016, Eke Panuku and our partners have laid the groundwork with the community. Several projects are already underway, including property sales to achieve high quality development outcomes, public realm upgrades, community building and coordination with initiatives that focus on building local job skills and employment opportunities.

Vision for Manukau

Manukau is the thriving heart and soul of the south. Manukau Central is the gateway to affordable and sustainable urban living, a meeting place and a hub for learning, leisure, cultural experiences, surrounded by healthy neighbourhoods

What we are Proposing

Eke Panuku has already delivered six significant public spaces and streetscape projects, sold four development sites, and implemented numerous small-scale improvements in the city centre. These projects are supported by Placemaking activations, events and initiatives. Progress in Manukau is well underway, with much more planned for the future.

The masterplan includes 41 projects. This is a combination of streetscape upgrades, open space/park upgrades, development sites, upgrades to existing council buildings and a programme of small, tactical upgrades such as new lighting and planting.



Cultural Context

STORY OF PLACE - WORKING WITH MANA WHENUA

Te hau o te whenua, te hau o te tangata

Mana whenua engagement on the Transform Manukau programme has articulated a cultural narrative specific to the area:

Mai I ngā maunga ki te moana From the mountains to the sea

This narrative has shaped the Masterplan, specifically the key move of unlocking the potential of the Puhinui Stream and connecting Manukau with its natural surroundings—from Maunga to Moana, Matukutureia (McLaughlan's Mountain) and the Matukutureia Stonefields, Matukutururu (Wiri Mountain) to the Manukau Harbour, Puhinui Stream, and Estuary.

The cultural narrative aims to provide context for ongoing discussions with Mana Whenua during future implementation through:

- expressing Mana Whenua cultural associations
- pursuing development consistent with Mana Whenua principles and guidance
- favouring a people-centred environment that supports community-building and an awareness and respect for the natural environment
- improving stormwater management, which should be an integral and visible part of the projects.



Five Key Moves



Key move one: Realising the potential of the Puhinui Stream – enhancing the Puhinui Stream corridor and creating a source of community pride, activity, movement and interaction.



Key move two: Creating a vibrant heart – redeveloping multiple sites throughout Manukau Central, overhauling the public realm, and creating places to live, work, play and celebrate.



Key move three: Developing the Wiri healthy neighbourhood – working in partnership to create healthy homes and neighbourhoods in the Wiri neighbourhood centred on the Puhinui Stream.



Key move four: Harnessing learning and innovation opportunities – supporting Manukau as a hub for end to end learning and business innovation, and enabling the community to drive social and economic prosperity.



Key move five: Enhancing community connectivity – further developing the public transport network, and spreading a safe cycling and walking network, to improve community connections, near and far.

Once completed Manukau will have:

- More affordable homes and housing choices
- A revamped Hayman Park and Manukau Plaza
- A healthy Puhinui Stream
- More job opportunities in the city centre
- Safe, vibrant and interesting streets



SELECTION OF PUBLIC REALM PROJECTS

1. Barrowcliffe Bridge and Place:

The bridge was designed to reconnect the Wiri community with the Manukau town centre, including a new walking and cycle route, making it safer and easier to access.

2. Putney Way Stage 1 Streetscape:

Stage one improved pedestrian access and environmental outcomes outside the new Bus Station. A Placemaking initiative with the community produced 10 artworks designed by local students with support from the Roots Collective. These were installed on lampposts to illustrate the melting pot of cultures that make up the local community.

3. Hayman Park Playground Stage 1:

Stage one included new play areas, a half basketball court, a kiosk and toilet building, a plaza and architectural canopy.

4. Hayman Park Playground Stage 2:

Stage two included a 12.8m high play tower, four age group playgrounds, a flying fox, BMX bike track and additional half-courts.

5. Wiri Bridge Upgrade:

This bridge connection is an important link to connect people safely into the Wiri Stream Reserve and along the Puhinui Stream to the central Manukau area.

6. Puhinui Wiri Playground:

The playground design is based around māra hūpara (natural play) and draws on the Puhinui Stream and natural environment for design themes.



SELECTION OF DEVELOPMENT SITE PROJECTS

1. Due Drop Events Centre Carpark (partial sale):

New Ramada hotel and residential building with 85 hotel units, 67 apartments and a restaurant/café. Located adjacent to the Wero Whitewater Park to the east and the Events Centre to the north.

2. 52-54 Manukau Station Road Site Sale:

Stage 1 is the new Manukau Institute of Technology Trades and Engineering Campus. It is a state-of-the-art 9,000m2 educational facility housing the engineering and trade schools.

3. Barrowcliffe Place Masterplan:

The project has seen the construction of 239 brand new 6 Homestar dwellings, including standalone houses, terraced homes, and 5 small apartment blocks to cater to the diverse needs of families and individuals in this neighbourhood. Further apartments and a co-living building will be added in the future.

4. Kotuitui Stage 1:

Kotuitui Limited Partnership (Te Ākitai Waiohua/Avant). A collection of 2 and 3 bedroom terrace homes.

5. Puhinui Park:

Puhinui Park Limited Partnership (New Zealand Housing Foundation, Te Tumu Kainga and CORT Community Housing). A collection of 1 and 2-bedroom apartments and 3-bedroom homes

6. Kotuitui Stage 2:

Kotuitui Limited Partnership (Te Ākitai Waiohua/Avant) A collection of 2 and 3 bedroom terrace homes.















Placemaking

SELECTION OF PLACEMAKING PROJECTS AND INITIATIVES

1. AUAHA Ō MANUKAU (Manukau Containers):

Auaha ō Manukau refers to the 4 container nodes (whare) placed around central Manukau. This placemaking initiative utilized repurposed Queens Wharf containers to bring more opportunity into Manukau for local community groups to test ideas in the physical space.

2. RE:Purpose/Use/Cycle Fashion Show:

This was a free community youth Fashion Show run by Dressed in Confidence. This was an initiative led by Nora Swann, who also leads the Pacific Fusion Fashion Show. The 3-day celebration in Manukau of Matariki, including the RE: Purpose/Use/Cycle Fashion Show, enabled our Transform Manukau aspirations at a grass-roots community level.

3. Manutahi

Manutahi is a network of local groups, organizations, and initiatives hosted by Eke Panuku. Initially known as the "Transform Manukau Advisory Group", this has flourished into a diverse group of passionate locals who support the Transform Manukau project.

4. The Pump Track at Manukau Sports Bowl:

The pump track is a semi-permanent interactive installation for bikes and gives us a chance to test the appetite for that activity in different spaces.

5. MATARIKI KI UTA:

This was a two-day free community signature event held on Osterley Way, Manukau to celebrate Matariki 2022 – the first public indigenous holiday for Aotearoa. Day-time activity included food & market stalls, customary Māori activities and games.
